

The Catechism Corner

A continuing series for the Calvary newsletter

“God is great and God is good, and we thank him for our food” may be familiar words at your dinner table, but that would not suffice for Luther. His table blessing includes prayers before AND after the meal. I experienced this with a host family in Holland when I was on a European choir tour as a youth. It was apparently commonplace in their home – but it wasn’t until years later that I realized it was Luther’s blessing since it was all in Dutch!

Take the time at a meal to try Luther’s table blessing with your family. But be sure to prepare them; it’s going to take a little more time!

TABLE BLESSINGS

according to Martin Luther

The children and the members of the household are to come devoutly to the table, fold their hands, and recite:

"The eyes of all wait upon you, O Lord, and you give them their food in due season. You open your hand and satisfy the desire of every living creature."

Then they are to recite the Lord's Prayer and the following prayer:

"Lord God, heavenly Father, bless us and these your gifts, which we receive from your bountiful goodness, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Similarly, after eating they should in the same manner fold their hands and recite devoutly:

"Give thanks to the Lord, for the Lord is good, for God's mercy endures forever. God provides food for the cattle and for the young ravens when they cry. God is not impressed by the might of a horse, and has no pleasure in the speed of a runner, but finds pleasure in those who fear the Lord, in those who await God's steadfast love."

Then recite the Lord's Prayer and the following prayer:

"We give thanks to you, Lord God our Father, through Jesus Christ our Lord for all your benefits, you who live and reign forever. Amen."

From the church, head west on Bellevue Avenue to Rt 61. Turn right on 61 to Reading Crest Blvd (at the WAWA). Make a left on Reading Crest and follow to Tuckerton Road. Turn left on Tuckerton to Stoudt's Ferry Bridge Road. Turn right on Stoudt's Ferry Bridge and follow to the signs. Jim Dietrich Park is on the left. Follow the park driveway down to the large pavilion up on the hill to the right.

Open Scripture. Join the Conversation.

The Book of Acts seemed so unfamiliar to me for many years. I didn't remember hearing passages read from Acts in church, and even if I did, I didn't really remember them. (Often the summer Sunday School curriculum covered the book of Acts, so maybe that's why I never learned much about it.)

The Acts of the Apostles starts with the Ascension of Jesus, a bit more detailed than the brief account in Luke 24. (You do know that the same author who wrote Luke also wrote Acts, right? Compare Luke 1 and Acts 1, which have similar introductions.) Then we quickly proceed into the exciting Pentecost event in Acts 2, the coming of the Holy Spirit and “the beginning of the Christian Church” with the baptism of 3,000 believers. The rest of Acts follows the mission of the original disciples, especially Peter, and the conversion and mission of Paul.

Peter and John heal a lame man in Acts 3 using the miraculous power given them by the Holy Spirit. Stephen, a newly appointed deacon and called to serve people like widows who need daily distribution of funds, is captured by the Jewish authorities and stoned to death while a man named Saul looks on (Acts 7). Philip is called by the Holy Spirit to speak to an Ethiopian who cannot interpret the scripture passage he is reading. When Philip interprets the Isaiah passage, telling him about Jesus, the Ethiopian asks to be baptized (Acts 8:26-40).

Saul's dramatic conversion occurs in Acts 9. He sees Jesus in a vision on his way to Damascus. Jesus asks Saul why he is persecuting him. Saul is left blind and led to a brave Christian man named Ananias, who knows Saul has been capturing Christians and putting them to death. Ananias heals Saul—now called Paul—and Paul becomes an indomitable force in spreading the gospel of Christ Jesus. Paul makes three missionary journeys, primarily reaching out to Gentiles (non-Jews). He has different travel partners; portions of Luke's writing sound like he also was traveling with Paul. (These are called the “we” passages.)

Acts 10-12 returns its focus to Peter and his gospel-sharing mission, then Acts 13-28 shifts back to Paul. Here we find some memorable stories: Paul converts Lydia in Philippi, and Paul is imprisoned with Silas in Philippi (Acts 16). (Maybe you remember this story about the earthquake setting Paul and all the prisoners free, but they don't escape, and the jailer and his whole household are baptized.)

We find two poignant passages about early Christians living in community together sharing all their possessions and living in harmony: Acts 2:43-47 and Acts 4:32-37. I guess it can really happen.

Have I gotten you interested enough to open the Bible to Acts yet? I'll leave the rest of Acts for you to explore yourself. Enjoy this sequel to Luke's gospel and learn about the beginning of the Christian church.

Included in the income numbers:

- Fund Raising Committee transferred \$6,000 towards the deficit.
- Monies have been received from Epiphany Lutheran Church for pastoral services in the amount of \$3,568 (year to date).

Included in the expense numbers:

- Payment of Worker's Compensation insurance for the balance of year: \$1,267
- Expenses for Synod Assembly: \$1,109
- Gas bill for heating has averaged \$2,450 a month from January to April. May's bill was \$821, so we should see a drop in expenses for this line item until the temperatures start to drop in the fall.
